March 4: "Lessons from Thailand." Sojirat Oho Kunvuts is an AFS exchange student from Thailand, currently living with Jim and Julia Nixon. A 16-year-old senior at East Noble High School, Oho was a member of the East Noble girls' swim team and serves on the Mayor's Youth Advisory Council in Kendallville. Susan Anderson, a friend of the Nixons, recently returned from a month in Southeast Asia,



including Thailand and Malaysia. Oho and Susan will share with us their experiences in Thailand, their observations about Thai culture, and their understanding of Buddhist philosophy.
