FROM THE PASTOR:

Friends-Not long ago I was asked about the paraments in the church, the change of colors, and the church calendar. I responded with an article for the newsletter which people seemed to appreciate. Since then, I have gotten other questions as relates to the Liturgical Calendar and I thought I would take this opportunity to go into those a little bit.

If you are at all familiar with "high church" or Roman Catholic tradition you know that they celebrate saint days. While I do not know enough to comment on these, I do know that nearly every day of the year has a saint assigned and they are referred to as feast days. Of course, some are lesser (less significant) and others are greater and how the church celebrates those feast days varies depending on their significance.

So, here comes some theological hair-splitting. Yes, Presbyterians believe in saints. But the saints we refer to are all the faithful who have died before us. This isn't to say that we know who makes it into heaven and it's not to say that we pray to those who have passed. What it does mean is that we recognize that there are some people who modeled a notably faithful life. Furthermore, we recognize that God is present in the daily lives of all the faithful, notable or not.

All of this talk about saints sets the groundwork to write about the church calendar. Where our brothers and sisters in other denominations celebrate special Sundays dedicated to saints, Presbyterians do not follow that tradition. Presbyterians don't acknowledge saint days, but we do celebrate liturgically significant Sundays. We all know Easter and Christmas are two big Sundays in our tradition, but there are others. For example, there is All Saints and Christ the King Sunday. We remember Transfiguration Sunday and Pentecost, as well. These special Sundays are tied to the liturgical calendar and have some sort of Biblical basis. One specially celebrated Sunday is World Communion Sunday, celebrated the first Sunday of October, which was created in the 20th century.

Just recently I was having a conversation with someone who mentioned that Presbyterians used to only celebrate communion quarterly. That is true and some of you reading might remember those days. Quarterly celebration of communion was **not** to make the practice more significant for the church. The larger rationale for this was that the celebration of communion was "Catholic" and Protestants used to do everything they could to distance themselves from those practices that seemed too formal, spiritual, or mystical.

Since those days, the Protestant Church (including Presbyterians) has experienced a wave of what is called liturgical renewal. This is evident in things like the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday, special Lenten activities and the much maligned no singing of Christmas Carols during Advent. Those are very obvious things, but less obvious is a greater reliance on the liturgical calendar and the celebration of the liturgically significant Sundays I wrote about above. These practices immerse us in the church universal and remind us of our connection to every worshipping community.

Thinking about these special Sundays, it occurs to me that they happen about once a month. I am not the first to notice this and know of several churches that celebrate communion on these liturgically significant Sundays. What do you think? This would link our communion celebration to Sundays that were Biblically significant, but it would also mean that we wouldn't always celebrate communion on the first Sunday of the month. Please speak to me or Susan Buttermore, the elder heading up the Worship and Music Committee, to let us know what you are thinking about something like this...Just an idea for us to mull over.
