FROM THE PASTOR:

Friends-As I sit to write this the recent shooting in Pittsburgh is fresh on my mind. The tragic assault on the Tree of Life Synagogue captured national attention and is especially meaningful to those of faith. By unwritten agreement in our society there are some places that we think of as exempt from acts of violence—churches, synagogues, mosques—these places of worship fall into that category. Any shooting is horrendous, but that it singled out people of faith makes it an even greater affront.

As I mentioned in my sermon Sunday, this sort of behavior is a sign of the degree to which some people are broken. There are people in our world who are broken, hurting, and in need to an extent that we can only begin to comprehend. Most of us don't have regular contact with people this broken so their thoughts and ideations are foreign and incomprehensible. There is a depth of need that is simply beyond the capacity to be understood by most people.

In the last few days I've had conversations with people about the "why" of the shooting. Why did this person do this? What did he hope to accomplish? What could have been done to avert this tragedy? In every conversation there is a different attempt to understand the "why". Some say it's due to the decay of the family. Others think if it weren't for social media this never would have happened. Some think it is due to our use of electronic devices. I don't know if we will ever be able to completely know why this man killed 11 people and injured six others.

While we can never know what would push a person to shoot up a place of worship, we do know that such a person is hurting and in need. It is here where a Christian can make a difference. As brothers and sisters of the same creator, we need to care for one another. We need to care for one another regardless of our politics, regardless of our religion, regardless of our nationality, skin color, or first language. We are called by our God to care for others.

This caring I'm writing about is something that can be a challenge. Wrapped up in our own lives and pulled by so many demands, it seems like we don't have time to add something else. Also, more often than not, the people we need to reach out to are precisely the ones that we would rather not speak to. However, caring for someone requires that we step away from our self interest and absorption to attend to another person. We care by taking the time to listen to and share stories. This is how we start living out the care for one another that God asks from us.

When we take the time and invest the effort in another person we begin to know them and, along with that knowing, comes an opportunity to share their hopes and hurts, their blessings and breaks. I know this is something a lot of us don't want to do. It's something easily sloughed off. In fact, it's easy to think something this insignificant can never make a difference. But when we neglect others we open the door for more hurting and need.

I don't know if there were other people involved in the life of the shooter in Pittsburgh, people who cared about him. What I do know is that God continues to offer us an invitation to join in God's mission of healing those in need. We start that effort with a small conversation. With that small start we begin the healing process. We begin to join God's work in our neighborhood.



PER CAPITA RELEASED: \$41.21 per confirmed member

Per Capita Apportionment is the Presbyterian Church's way of attempting to fairly and evenly cover the cost of the ecclesiastical expenses of all three governing bodies beyond the local church: the Presbytery of Wabash Valley, the Synod of Lincoln Trails, and the General Assembly. Our Wabash Valley Presbytery represents all northern Indiana Presbyterian ministries. Our Lincoln Trails Synod consists of all Indiana and Illinois Presbyterian Church ministries. And finally, the General Assembly, headquartered in Louisville, Kentucky, provides for our global Presbyterian Church outreach ministries.

Per Capita is assessed on the number of active members on the church's roll. Each governing body beyond our Session determines how much Per Capita it will assess the membership. For next year, our church Per Capita Apportionment is: \$41.21 per member. You may make your checks out to the Auburn Presbyterian Church and either mail to the church office or drop in the offering plate. Be sure to mark at the bottom of your check "per capita" so the treasurer will apply the funds appropriately.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

We have a very strong lineup of topics and speakers this month so please join us in the lounge following worship. All are welcome!

Nov. 4: What does it mean to be a "mere Christian"? Join us as we take a brief look at the life and work of C. S. Lewis, the British scholar thought by many to be the greatest lay theologian of the 20th century. This educator, author and Christian apologist called himself an atheist until his conversion to Christianity in 1931. During World War II, he delivered well-received radio broadcasts in England on the subject of Christianity, with his essays later adapted into his acclaimed non-fiction work "Mere Christianity." We'll look at some of Lewis's works and discuss their relevance for today. Marjorie Reinsch will lead our discussion.

Nov. 11: Each of us is a theologian, whether we know it or not. On Nov. 11 and again on Nov. 25, we will explore theologies that may assist us in our journey of faith, and we will begin by taking a brief look at two theologians from the 20th century – Paul Tillich (1886 - 1965) and Rosemary Ruether (1936 -). Tillich's focus was the relationship between religion and culture; Ruether's was on overcoming sexism through Christian feminism. Bring your questions as we together celebrate God's claim on our lives. The Rev. Stan Wilson will lead our discussion.

Nov. 18: We will welcome guest speaker and organist David Eicher, who helped create the most recent PCUSA hymnal "Glory to God." Eicher is a friend of Pastor David. (please see his bio below)

Nov. 25: The Rev. Stan Wilson will continue to lead our discussion on 20th-century theologians.

David Eicher is Staff Assistant in the Department of Music at Saint Mary's College, Notre Dame, IN and accompanist for the college choirs. He also serves as organist at Grace Methodist Church in South Bend and is a part-time Hymnal Consultant for Presbyterian Publishing Corporation in Louisville, KY. Prior to his current position, David was Hymnal Editor for Presbyterian Publishing Corporation where he served as Editor for *Glory to God: The Presbyterian Hymnal* published in 2013. He has been a church musician in Northwest Indiana for almost 30 years, Accompanist/ Assistant Director of the South Bend Chamber Singers from 1990-2007 and Accompanist for the Northwest Indiana Symphony Orchestra Chorus from 2006-2007.

David holds degrees in organ and church music from Manchester College and Valparaiso University. He is a past president of the Presbyterian Association of Musicians and The Hymn Society in the United States and Canada and also holds professional memberships in the American Guild of Organists and the Association for Reformed & Liturgical Worship.
