FROM THE PASTOR:

Brothers and Sisters-I hope you are all doing well and looking forward to spring. It's so exciting to see the little sprouts begin to make their appearance!

I was in a conversation with someone the other day and she observed that our culture seems to have forgotten about common courtesy. We were particularly talking about saying thank you, but went on from there. Please, thank you, and you're welcome seem to have disappeared. Some might say that we live with a sense of entitlement and expect everything we are given or the help we receive. I'm not sure if that's the case, or if people are just so immersed in their lives that they don't recognize it when others give them a hand.

The more I think about it, the more I think that's the case. We are over-busy, over-burdened and over-scheduled. No one has time for anything—it seems like something is always demanding our attention or asking that we get involved and there's hardly any room to care for ourselves. We get so caught up in our "stuff" that there's no room for anything or anybody else. This is not healthy.

We rush through our days intent on accomplishing our tasks. Our attention becomes so focused and our freedom so limited that we often don't give a second thought to those tasks, what drives us or what we stand for. We become human doings rather than human begins. This is the situation that results in a loss of courtesy and caring. The loss of common courtesy also reflects the loss of peace (shalom and Sabbath).

Of course, we all are familiar with <u>Jesus' commandment to love one another</u>. But there are so many <u>other passages</u> that encourage us to live lives that are focused on the other rather than ourselves. All of this suggests that shalom and Sabbath are found not in our tasks or how fast we run but, rather in caring for others. Life is not about bemoaning our hard day, but caring about how someone else is doing. This is where we find our peace and wholeness—in caring for others.

Our world is hungry for caring and hospitality. It really matters how we treat people and how we interact with them. Soon after my conversation with a friend I came upon <u>this article</u>. I hope you take the time to at least skim this discussion about the impact of kindness on our congregation. We are called to satisfy the world's hunger to be loved and cared for.

It's so easy to skip, but the few minutes it takes to actually listen to how someone is doing are invaluable. Hospitality and courtesy are as simple as practicing a smile and offering a warm greeting. This caring should define how we live our lives, but should be especially apparent in our congregation. It is here that we should all be able to find a safe harbor the midst of the storms of life. It is here that one can find Sabbath rest. In the church, courtesy should be common and caring should be overwhelming.

FROM THE CE DIRECTOR:



Here's a recap of programs so far:

In February, youth and adults hosted a successful Spaghetti Dinner and Bake/Craft sale.
