Mark your calendar for Sunday, June 2! Tim Denton, our church organist from several years ago, will return to APC to play the organ during worship. Tim and his family now live in Noblesville, Indiana. He currently serves as the organist/director of music at St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Indianapolis. Prior to his service at Auburn Presbyterian, Tim held similar positions at St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Louisville and at Trinity English Lutheran Church in Fort Wayne, where he shared responsibilities with Robert Hobby, director of music. Tim is also active as a composer. His choral setting of Psalm 103 is published by MorningStar Music, and his composition "Sing to the Lord" has been accepted into the Choristers Guild catalogue.

Tim's significant musical talents, shared with us in worship on June 2, will both honor our church's 175th anniversary and commemorate the 50th "birthday" of our Reuter organ, installed in 1969.

Following worship Tim, Michelle, and their two children will be recognized at a reception in the church lounge. Please plan to be in worship and stay to greet the Denton family!

FROM THE PASTOR:

This past Sunday John Jackson spoke to the congregation about some projects that the Mission Committee has in mind. This congregation has always had an interest in the world beyond itself. True, we struggle at times to discern how best to become involved in those issues, but we strive to be true to God's call to transform.

One of the signature missions of Auburn Presbyterian is the Friends' Table. Every Monday this committed group works hard to prepare well over one hundred meals. The on-going nature of this mission is a sign of the need that exists in our community. Right outside the doors of our church there are families that are struggling to feed their children, pay utility bills, and secure medical care.

Saturday before Easter APC participated with St. Marks Lutheran to sponsor a party for the students of McKenney-Harrison School. In spite of the cold and rain, over a hundred kids showed up for egg hunts, hot dogs, popcorn, and games. This was a great opportunity to meet our neighbors and I want to thank everyone who helped out with this endeavor.

I don't want to discount the need that surrounds us, but we are surrounded by a mission field right in our neighborhood. Mission is not about building up our Sunday worship or recruiting church members. Mission is about caring for our neighbors, sharing our abundance, and walking along-side hurting people. Rather than thinking of ourselves as helping out those in need and ignoring our own hurts, we should think about this as a mutual helping and how we all benefit from these relationships.

Although it's a foreign language for us, St Marks talks about "loving on" our neighbors and that's something we can start to do. We can show them a different way to be—a way that values individuals and embodies care for others. If we can show the world what it means to be a Christian we can challenge the powers and principalities of the earth. Enfleshing God's love provides an alternative to a culture that doesn't think of people as anything more than economic units.

Granted, forming these relationships can be challenging. A lot of times we don't have the words or know how to go about relating to people who are a little different from us. Things like the Easter gathering are ways to ease into those relationships and I will be working with the school to provide more opportunities for our congregation to get to know our neighbors.

I want to lead the church in being more of a presence in our neighborhood, touching the mission field that surrounds us. There is a very simple way for you to start participating in this mission. Just walk around the church. Look around you as you walk. Listen to the sounds of the neighborhood. As you walk just try to take in what you see. You might even want to say a prayer that God reveals God's heart to you in the midst of Auburn.

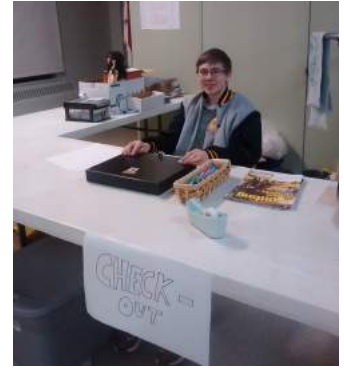

MAY MUD BUCKET MISSION PROJECT

The mission survey results are in and the final tally showed a well-rounded concern for all geographic locations. To this end, our May 2019 mission project is a “Mud Bucket” project to help flood victims regardless of location.

April showers bring May flowers and in this part of the world with Spring comes flooding. We are all aware of the recent snow melt and subsequent flooding in some of our Midwest states. As this article is being written we know of heavy rains in the South. Flood waters will drain away leaving mud, destruction and the hard work of salvaging what is left. Cleanup is tough and getting some of the most basic of cleaning supplies can be difficult. Electricity can be out for days or even weeks, making cleanup even more of a challenge.

How can you help?

We are challenging you, members and friends of APC to help us assemble and complete 25 “Mud Buckets” during the month of May. These buckets will then be delivered to Church World Services for distribution in locations recently hit hard by flooding. Each bucket contains a “list” of items of essential cleaning supplies, sponges, brushes, and other practical supplies. Members can choose to purchase items and help fill our little red wheelbarrow or donate for the purchase of items. Donations should include a note for “Mud Buckets”

The Supplies needed should be new and are the following:

- Four Scouring Pads
- Seven sponges, including one large
- One scrub brush
- Eighteen reusable cleaning towels (e.g. Handi Wipes or Easy Wipes)
- One 50 oz. or two 25 oz. liquid laundry detergent
- One 16-28 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap
- One 12-16 oz. bottle of concentrated household cleaner (like Lysol) No spray bottles
- One package 48-50 clothespins
- Clothesline, two 50 ft or one 100 ft
- Five dust masks
- Two pair heavy duty dishwashing gloves (latex-free, non-surgical)
- One pair work gloves, cotton with leather palm or all leather
- 24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gal. trash bags on a roll
- One 6-9 oz bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent

Each bucket once filled and completed costs approximately \$75.00. Please join us in collecting supplies and helping us fill the buckets to help others affected by flooding. In so doing we are the hands and feet of Christ to those in need.

Youth Sunday is May 5. Please join us as the youth lead us in worship that morning.

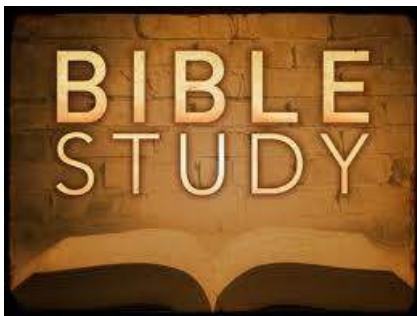
Volunteer Recognition Sunday is May 19. During worship we look forward to recognizing all who have helped with our Christian Education programming this year.
