FROM THE PASTOR

Friends-How has your day been? I was really busy today and what's even better—I got to do something I really like. I got to have some wonderful conversations. Some of those conversations were really passionate and others were deeply compassionate. I got to talk with people about their joys and concerns for themselves, their friends, the church, and the world. All in all, this day was enriched by being with others in this way.

The joy of these conversations is that in these stories we welcome each other into our lives. This is an opportunity to share our opinions and make ourselves vulnerable by that honesty. These stories are what make us who we are and in telling the story we share ourselves. In the process of conversation, story sharing, we create a possibility to grow as people, as God's people, and the church. We do that by making ourselves available for relationship.

There is another important part to conversation. Not only is this about talking and telling, it's about listening. Good conversation involves "thick listening", which is listening and hearing rather than listening and mentally preparing our response. Listening like this conveys that we value the other, that they are an important child of God. Through this practice we call one another into deeper relationship and develop a deeper caring for one another.

We wonder why Jesus taught with parables. I think one of the reasons is that we are drawn into those stories. Our thoughts slow and our attention is captured through story. Narrative works as a gateway to deep listening because stories engage us much more readily than bare facts and statements. Jesus' parables cause us to suspend judgment for just a second to hear what is said.

In our rushing world, it is difficult to develop the practice of deep listening. All too often we live in a way that is only concerned with conveying our message to another person. We don't really care what our conversation partner has to say and our demeanor cries out, "Listen to me!". This is the communication style of our culture. We all get

caught up in life and focused on our own agenda, even when we know better.

I am going to suggest that we all slow down a little. I am going to suggest that we try to listen more closely to our conversation partners. I am *not* saying that you have to agree with what someone is saying to you—in fact, you might profoundly disagree. I am just asking you to listen before joining the debating society. Listen to what another person is saying long enough to really hear them. Care enough to listen. When both people engage in this practice we can begin the slow progress toward changing the world.

I don't know why, but this song by Jackie DeShannon came to my mind. Jesus calls us to love one another. We show that love by caring enough to listen to what someone has to say. There is plenty of strife and disagreement in the world today. The only way to mend our divisions is by listening to one another and experimenting with some new ways of being in community together.

IT'S THAT EASY! We hope EVERYONE will participate by submitting their recipes. Don't forget to put your name on the recipe.


FROM THE CHRISTIAN EDUCATION DIRECTOR:


