Brothers and Sisters:

I hope you are all well and doing those things you need to do to care for yourselves physically, mentally, and spiritually. These have been some challenging days and we are inspired to creatively live into a "new normal".

I wanted to share some information with you that came out of our session meeting on the 20th. As of that meeting there had been no statements from Governor Holcomb, the Indiana Dept. of Health, or the City of Auburn regarding reopening. Furthermore, the Coronavirus infection rate in the state continues to climb, which presents a special hazard for those who are in high risk categories. Considering the information before us, the session decided that we would continue gathering virtually for the next month. We are able to revisit this decision if the situation changes significantly, but we believe the most prudent course of action is to take this up at our May meeting (May 18th).

I know the current situation is disappointing and frustrating and it seems like this will never end. I share those feelings and long to see all of you face-to-face (even at an appropriate distance). What I also know is that this is a small sacrifice if it prevents even one of you from serious illness or death. For all of us this means putting aside our wants and desires out of care for another.

Not worshipping together presents another issue. When we don't meet on Sundays we get out of the habit of presenting our tithes and offerings. The church has experienced a decrease in our collection and I want to encourage you to make online payments or mail in a check for your offering during this time. When restrictions are eased, the church needs to be poised to assist with the ever increasing needs of our community and that will require financial resources, as well as time and effort from us all.

One of my greatest joys during this time has been the congregation's willingness to experiment with new ways of communicating. Who would have imagined? Some of you have become pros with Zoom; and FaceBook is a virtual hangout for many of us. The staff, the leadership, and I have been working hard behind the scenes to keep our relationships strong, but the congregation as a whole has demonstrated a remarkable spirit and ability to find God's bubbling presence outside the walls of church. I applaud your faithful commitment to the mission of Christ through Auburn Presbyterian Church.

May the Lord Bless and keep you; may God's face shine upon you.
