FROM THE PASTOR:

Brothers and Sisters:

I hope you are well. The sun is shining and spring is in the air...but it is Indiana and we can never know what tomorrow's weather will bring. Anyway, I wanted to use this newsletter to tell you about something that's been going on in the background over the last year.

About 18 months ago I asked the session for approval to go through a process of Appreciative Inquiry. AI is a conversational process that a congregation uses to move forward based on the skills and talents we experienced in our past. The other night someone said it reminded them of the Sankofa bird that symbolizes the need for history to shape learning.



This process is a good fit for APC and I made plans to get it going—then there was a pandemic. But Appreciative Inquiry is not dead! A small group of us continued to meet through the fall and winter months. During that time, we prayed and planned, dreamed and discerned what AI would be like for the Auburn Church. We met on Zoom and used a congregational coach to move through this work. The pandemic's gift was time to reflect and plan the process.

Many of us are unfamiliar with the AI process. This really amounts to a series of guided conversations about our past that help us discern how God is calling us to move ahead. The group of us envision these conversations occurring in small groups. Because the virus is still a risk, we are planning how to arrange these conversations. We want to provide everyone with an opportunity to share their stories and experiences because some voices can get overlooked.

Guided conversations are just that; we've developed some questions to help us stay on track and steer our conversations. The group and I want to share these questions with you so we can start reflecting on our experiences. We'd like to start our conversations talking about these questions:

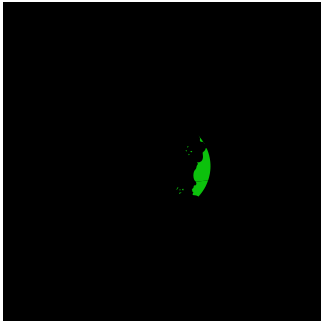
Describe a time when you were most excited by or felt the deepest sense of connection to our church?

Describe a time when APC influenced your faith. What happened?

Was there a time when you were personally involved with APC to impact the community beyond the congregation? What were the results? What is the mission that God has called us to do?

Please think about these questions. Reflect on your experiences, your stories, and your history with APC. We will get together and chat after Easter.
