**FROM THE PASTOR:**

Dear Sisters and Brothers-

I had an interesting conversation with one of our deacons this month. We talked about all the things that are going on in the world. We spent a lot of time talking about the cries for social justice that we heard last summer, their spread to other countries, and the possible re-ignition of those flames with the trial in Minnesota. Then we brought up the 2020 election and the pandemic, along with climate change, unemployment, failing small businesses, actions around voting rights, and a worsening immigration crisis.

We are experiencing significant change on so many levels and struggle to keep up with it. This deacon and I wondered about how to cope with this change when the old systems and coping mechanisms don't seem to work. There is a sense that we have lost control and everything is falling apart. What are we to make of this? My deacon friend and I agreed that we are in the middle of a huge transition. No one knows what's going on, what to do, or where we're going to end up.

Not knowing is the most difficult part of this transition. We are unable to see what's ahead of us, but we know it's going to be different. Not knowing and feeling out of control is uncomfortable and scary. There's no shame in admitting that it's frightening living in this day and age. It's human nature to feel this way, but we need to be mindful of how we react to that feeling.

One response is to believe we are entering the "end times". People point to verses like this from Matthew 24:

You will hear of wars and rumors of wars, but see to it that you are not alarmed. Such things must happen, but the end is still to come. Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be famines and earthquakes in various places. All these are the beginning of birth pains.

This and other apocalyptic passages from Luke 21 and Mark 13 are thought by some to be clear signs that the end is near. This sort of thinking illustrates our need for control – when we are out of control it must mean the world is coming to an end. Even Martin Luther reacted this way, but he thought the world was ending in 1548.

Some people are alarmed and it's understandable why they would look to these Scriptures. What they neglect are the many other verses (Matt 24, I Thes. 5, II Peter 3, and Rev. 3) that all tell us no one knows the days or times. Prophesying the end is foolish because no one knows. How then, are Christians to react to all of this change?

The reformer Jean Calvin informs my reaction to these unsettling times. Calvin did not deny the second coming of Christ, but he sees a faithful response to the coming end. Calvin wrote that it was our duty to serve God in our daily life. Calvin also believed that it was our responsibility to bear spiritual fruit every day of our lives. This meant as individuals and in social life, as well, to work on God's mission of love and justice. Our consolation and hope are in Jesus Christ and we need to live that out every day.

Are we in the middle of a great transition? Yes, nearly every facet of our lives are affected by this change. Is it the end of the world? No one knows. All we can do in this trying time is remember what God has asked of us – Love the Lord and love your neighbor as yourself.

We welcome all to take part and/or volunteer for the various groups. We have a particular need for helpers to come on Tuesdays and Thursdays for the Homework Helper program. This time will be much more than just helping with homework. This time will be a time to create relationships and love some who may not feel that feeling outside the church doors.

We also have a couple of prayer requests. Currently, our greatest challenge is transporting the people who would like to take part in our programs. We are borrowing a van from New Hope in Waterloo. Still, that van was filled to capacity before we even began meeting in-person again for the youth group. There are no other places to borrow transportation. In reality, we need a bus. We could quickly fill it at least halfway right now. Please pray that God opens the door and paves the way for us to purchase a bus.

After speaking with our insurance and many well-educated people, the estimated cost to purchase, paint, register, plate, and insure a bus would be approximately \$10,000. Each year it will cost roughly \$5,000 to maintain and insure the bus.
