FROM THE PASTOR:

Brothers and Sisters-

Last month I wrote about a conversation I had with one of our Deacons. This month I was struck by a conversation that I had with one of our Elders after a session meeting. This conversation was inspired by a video from our presbyter, Jennifer Burns Lewis, who spoke about the state of the presbytery.

I mentioned to this Elder that for the Gallup poll reported this year that American church membership was below 50%. Gallup attributes this decline partly to the death of older Americans for whom church attendance was a staple, which is validated by the increasing number of Millennials and Gen-X'ers who claim no religious affiliation. While this is not news to most of us, what sticks out is the rapid decline in church membership over the last 20 years.

The Elder and I were talking about this trend, which concerned him. The Elder pointed out that the church was the foundation for so many of society's institutions. He talked about how religion shapes us and how we get our moral guidance through the church. We talked about how the church served as the place where people were taught right and wrong, as well as the responsibility to care for others. The role of the church has been so influential that this Elder fears the self-destruction of the nation without the guidance of the church.

No one can deny that the church offers many valuable life lessons – don't steal, don't lie, care about others, and make a difference. But, as our culture changes, the church's formative role is shrinking. What is there to do?

Perhaps it's our mission to discern where these lessons are or can be taught. Several possibilities occur to me like Big Brothers/Sisters, the YMCA, and the Scouts to name a few. If we hope to impact the moral formation of America, maybe we should look at how we can do so through those groups. This isn't to say that we should give up on the church, but maybe we can begin to think about a different way for the church to exist in our culture. Maybe the church is better suited to partner with other groups that have taken over its role.

God has a task for the Auburn Presbyterian Church. As we begin the process of determining what God is calling us to be, we need to consider the lessons we offer as a strength. We then need to discern how God is calling us to share those practices.

In the midst of this Easter season, with the wonder of Christ's resurrection still fresh in our memories, it is appropriate to consider our response to this generous act of love. What to do? In Matthew we read, "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit." Mark extols us to "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation." Luke says, "repentance and forgiveness of sin is to be proclaimed to the nations." That's a clear directive!

When gathering for worship was restricted because of Covid just over a year ago, we grabbed the opportunity to worship via Zoom. We also utilized FaceBook Live because that allowed us to record our services with the ability to access them at alternative times, or even multiple times. It started out as a way to keep our congregation connected even when we had to be apart.

What we have learned is that by being online, we have been carrying out this commission to "go forth". While we have made it possible for those in our midst who are not physically able to be present in our sanctuary even though restrictions are relaxing, we have also been reaching out into our community and into the world beyond that.

When we Zoom, we know basically who is participating with us. On FaceBook Live we do not know who, but we can tabulate how many "hits" or time people have open up to our services. Sometime the number of hits has been astounding. For example, when checking information pertaining to traffic on Facebook Live on February 7, the number of hits for 12-20-20 was 191, for 12-24-20 it was 155, and the number for 12-27-20 was 164!

By maintaining our online presence we are making a very appropriate response to Christ's love for us! We are going into the world. We are sharing and proclaiming the good news!


So this year, I invite everyone to enjoy the new additions to our church. Remember that all of you were a big part in making this a success.
