FROM THE PASTOR:

Brothers and Sisters-

Right now I'm in the middle of a book called *The Prodigal God* by Timothy Keller. This interesting book breaks down the parable of the Prodigal Son and takes a close look at its characters and their motivation. Keller then digs into those motivations and how they ultimately Glorify God or if they are more directed at self-glorification. I wanted to share some of the author's conclusions with you.

Keller's point of view is that the greatest sin in the story is the broken relationship between humanity and God. He uses the relationships between the two sons and their father to illustrate that fracture and writes about how the prodigal and his elder brother both turn their back on their father. From Keller's perspective, neither of the men really cares about their father and their father's love. He describes the self-interest and selfishness that is the basis of their sin – it's all about them, what they want, and what benefits them.

Part of the human condition is our bondage to ourselves and our self-interest. We want to put ourselves, our families, and our interests first. When we put ourselves first, we are slow to come to the aid of others, especially when we perceive it as threatening what we have and our comfort. Ou culture prioritizes self-interest which reinforces the centrality of self. In our culture, care for others is seen as a voluntary luxury that only a few choose to do.

The Prodigal God asks us to re-examine ourselves and our relationships. If we agree with Keller's premise, then we need to guard against the default behavior of using people to meet our needs. This book encourages us to approach each day as another opportunity to serve God and other, rather than thinking about what we can get out of a relationship. We need to ask ourselves what we can give instead of how something benefits us. Keller describes the focus on the other as a defining characteristic of Jesus' life and ministry and believes that if Christians are true to their faith they will behave that way.

I suggest *The Prodigal God* if you're looking for a book to read. There's a copy in our library and it's a relatively quick read. Let me know what you think.
