FROM THE PASTOR:

What do you think about clergy collars – some people call them dog collars? Some Presbyterians wear them a lot, like the pastor I grew up with. Several of my friends are Lutheran clergy and most of them wear a collar all the time. More recently, Fran came home from a conference saying that she was going to start wearing clergy collars more frequently. Over the years I have acquired a couple of clergy shirts, but only wear them at occasions like funerals or important times in the church.

A clerical collar is like a giant sign identifying a clergyperson and the collars as we know them emerged in the mid-19th century for that very purpose. A clergy collar reminds the community and the wearer of the sacred and spiritual role of clergy. While any clergyperson, even rabbis, can wear a collar, it's most often associated with Catholics. The traditional practice of wearing a clerical collar was born out of the hierarchical church because it draws a clear line between clergy and laity.

There is an argument that the church has lost its place in our culture and wearing a collar is a visible way of clawing back some of that authority. Some promote wearing a collar to separate clergy from the world, to suggest that there is something greater. These are strong arguments, but there is another side. Some would say that the church is already separate from mainstream culture and a collar only emphasizes that separation. We share the good news with our stories through relationships and drawing a line makes that more difficult.

So, what do you think? Does it benefit the church to draw attention to clergy? To mark them as different and separate? Does the collar even mean those things in the world today?



The national program is overseen by Prison Fellowship, an evangelical organization formed by Charles Colson as a result of his experiences in jail. Angel Tree's objective is to connect parents in prison with their children through the delivery of Christmas gifts. It is a volunteer program, one in which we are given the names of families and the needs of their children. An "Angel Tree" will be placed in the Narthex of the church on the First Sunday of Advent (December 3rd). Members who want to bring the joy of Jesus' birth to DeKalb County children whose parents are incarcerated may take an angel off the tree and buy a gift for a child.
